Mini-Idaho 5th Grade Lesson Plan: Incorporating Podcasts into Journalism

Lesson Title: Exploring Journalism through Podcasts

Duration: 1 Week (5 Class Periods)

Idaho Writing Standards Addressed:

- W.5.2: Write informative/explanatory texts to examine a topic and convey ideas and information clearly.
- **W.5.4:** Produce clear and coherent writing in which the development and organization are appropriate to task, purpose, and audience.
- W.5.5: With guidance and support from peers and adults, develop and strengthen writing as needed by planning, revising, editing, rewriting, or trying a new approach.
- **SL.5.1:** Engage effectively in a range of collaborative discussions (one-on-one, in groups, and teacher-led) with diverse partners on grade 5 topics and texts, building on others' ideas and expressing their own clearly.
- **SL.5.5:** Include multimedia components (e.g., graphics, sound) and visual displays in presentations when appropriate to enhance the development of main ideas or themes.

Objectives:

- Students will understand the basics of journalism and podcasting.
- Students will research, write, and record a short podcast episode.
- Students will demonstrate their understanding of journalistic writing and multimedia presentation.

Materials:

- Internet access and computers/tablets
- Microphones and audio recording devices/software
- Examples of kid-friendly podcasts (e.g., "Brains On!" or "But Why: A Podcast for Curious Kids")
- Writing materials (notebooks, pens, or digital word processors)

Day-by-Day Plan:

Day 1: Introduction to Journalism and Podcasts

- Activity:
 - Discuss what journalism is and the role of journalists.
 - o Introduce podcasts as a modern form of journalism and media.
 - o Play a short kid-friendly podcast episode.
- Discussion Questions:
 - o What did you learn from the podcast episode?
 - o How is a podcast similar to and different from a news article?

Day 2: Research and Topic Selection

Activity:

- o Students brainstorm topics they are interested in.
- Students conduct research on their chosen topic using books, articles, and online resources.

• Guided Practice:

- o Teach students how to take notes and organize information.
- o Discuss reliable sources and how to identify them.

Day 3: Writing the Podcast Script

• Activity:

- Students draft a script for their podcast episode.
- o Teach the structure of a podcast script: introduction, main content, conclusion.

• Guided Practice:

o Peer review and teacher feedback sessions to revise and refine scripts.

Day 4: Recording the Podcast

• Activity:

- Students practice reading their scripts out loud.
- o Set up recording devices and guide students through the recording process.
- o Introduce basic editing tools to clean up their recordings.

• Group Work:

 Students can work in pairs or small groups to help each other with recording and editing.

Day 5: Presentation and Assessment

• Activity:

- Students present their podcasts to the class.
- o Provide a rubric for peer and self-assessment focusing on content accuracy, script structure, clarity of recording, and overall presentation.

• Discussion:

- Reflect on what was learned through the process of creating a podcast.
- o Discuss challenges faced and how they were overcome.

Assessment:

• Formative Assessments:

- o Participation in discussions and brainstorming sessions.
- Quality of research and note-taking.
- o Peer review feedback and revisions.

• Summative Assessment:

 Final podcast script and recording evaluated using a rubric that includes criteria for content accuracy, script structure, clarity of recording, and overall presentation.
